## FREE RATE STUDY

#### Why Have a Rate Study Conducted?

With the amount of grant dollars available for water and wastewater projects continuing to dwindle, coupled with the aging water and/or wastewater infrastructure, it is increasingly more important that decision makers for systems throughout the state become more educated about system finances. This **FREE** rate study takes an in-depth look into the expenses and revenue that a system has. Once all of the data has been gathered and entered into a spreadsheet a detailed report is generated to explain the findings and recommendations. This easy to read report and any rate changes recommended will assist Boards and Councils in mapping out the financial future of their respective systems.

#### What Information Will the Rate Study Provide?

- $\Rightarrow$  Breakdown of expenses
- ⇒ The cost to produce the water (if applicable)
- $\Rightarrow$  Amount of nonrevenue water
- ⇒ Amount of lost revenue from water loss
- $\Rightarrow$  Annual gain or shortfall in revenue
- $\Rightarrow$  Different rate scenarios



#### What Information Will I Need to Supply For a Rate Study?

- ⇒ Financial statements for the most current fiscal year (audit report preferred)
- ⇒ Amount of water produced and/or purchased during the most current fiscal year
- ⇒ Amount of water sold during the most current fiscal year
- ⇒ Current rate structure
- ⇒ Number of customers in each rate class
- ⇒ Amount of debt (if any)

Increase technical assistance capacity through the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). Enables producers to plan and implement conservation practices that are appropriate for their needs.
CRP GENERAL	New Climate-Smart Practice Incentive to incentivize practices that sequester carbon, reduce emissions. Adjustment of county rental rates, upward or downward, using a soil productivity index range of 50-150 percent of the county rental rate. CRP GRASSLANDS	Establish a CRP Grassland minimum rental rate of \$15. Establish National Grassland Priority Zones.	Returning to this minimum rate would benefit 1,347 counties that are currently under the \$15 minimum. Increase enrollment of grasslands in migratory corridors and environmentally sensitive areas.
PILOTS	Hold a second signup for the Soil Health and Income Protection Program (SHIPP), incentivizing producers to plant vegetative cover on less productive croplands for 3 to 5 years. Expand the Clean Lakes, Estuaries and Rivers 30-year contracts (CLEAR30) to be nationwide. Previous pilots were in the Chesapeake Bay and Great Lakes regions.	More land with short-term cover leads to healthier soil and better carbon sequestration. Pilot expansion enables producers across the nation to enter into these long-term contracts and implement practices important to water quality.
